

## Maths

We are learning about\* 2D shapes (flat shapes) 3D shapes (fat shapes)

Please use these as your main maths activities and then we have added some extra fun bits below if you want them.

\*Use the pictures below- can you remember the names of all of the shapes?



\*Can you build a model with 3D shapes- use wooden bricks, junk boxes, tubes etc. Talk about the shapes you have used.

\*Can you complete the sorting shapes activities attached? There is 1 for 2D and 1 for 3D

\*Can you find the correct shapes and colour them in the correct colour on the shape colouring activity?

\*Can you make some shape biscuits or playdough shapes biscuits? If you don't have any cutters you can carefully use a knife to cut your own shapes. You could make a playdough shape picture.



## Writing

Remember to use your phonic knowledge. Some words won't be spelt correctly but as long as you can read them phonetically that is ok. Don't forget to use your tricky words

## Communication and Language

Remember to encourage discussion and conversation. Talking about what you are doing and learning helps to consolidate it into the long term memory. This is the expressive part of language development.

\*Can you answer the questions about the story? Remember to answer with a full sentence.

What happened in the story?

Can you remember the days in the week?

What did Jasper plant in the ground?

What did you think the seed would grow into?

How do plants grow? What do they need?


What tools do you need to plant a seed?

What is at the top of the beanstalk?



Understanding of language is crucial in children's learning. Can they listen carefully and answer how questions?

\*Use the picture cards attached to answer How questions



e.g.

How does the bean grow? "First the root grows down, next the shoot grows up, last the leaves grow."

## Understanding of the World

\*Can you plant your own bean? You can plant them in several different ways-try growing one in a plastic bag or jam jar (you can really see the roots)



Plant one in soil (toilet roll, yogurt pots)



\*Talk about what the bean needs to grow, what will happen first, next? Where is the best place to put it? What do we need to do once it is as tall as a water bottle?

\*Can you keep a diary of what happens to your bean? Can you write a sentence on your whiteboard to tell us what is happening? Take a photo of your writing and bean at regular intervals. We would love to see.



\*What other things can you grow- cress, carrots, lettuce sunflowers.....

## Personal, social and emotional development

- Talk about growing plants
- What do you need to plant a seed?
- What does the plant need to grow?
- Look at different types of seeds and compare them
- Look at things we eat that grow, things we like to eat and where they are grown.
- Talk about a variety of plants, veg and fruit we eat and look at the plants they grown on.

- bike ride


### 5. Help around the house


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
