Maths

We are learning to* practise counting with real objects

The government has set up<u>https://www.thenational.academy/_</u>online classroom>subject>Reception>maths on here are maths lessons for each day, You will need to start with the 1st lesson whichever day you start. Please use these as your main maths activities and then we have added some extra fun bits below if you want them.



* Make your own sea shells and number from 1-20. Put the correct number of pegs on each shell.

*Peg the shells on a washing line in the correct order. What number is 1 fewer/less than 5?

*Count the stairs in your house.

*Find 5 red items, now find 5 more. How many have you got altogether? Double 5 is 10!

*Complete the under the sea counting sheet (you don't have to print it off, you can write the answers on your whiteboard)

*Complete the count and colour activity. How many fish are there altogether?

*Sit in your garden for 2 minutes. How many birds can you see? Use your whiteboard to write the numerals or make a tally.

Literacy

Remember to use your phonic knowledge. Some words won't be spelt correctly but as long as you can read them phonetically that is ok. Don't forget to use your tricky words and sound mats.

*Use the link provided to listen to the book 'commotion in the ocean' This is a rhyming poem book.

*Whilst listening to the book can you hear the rhyming words, jot them down as you go through. Now make a list of all the words that you can think of that rhyme with 'shark, you might think of real words such as 'park' or nonsense words like 'jark'

*Once you have listened to the book talk to your child about what a poem is, how it rhymes, and is not too long. Choose a Sea creature and have a go at writing a poem about it.

Understanding of the World

Here are some ideas for you to do at home which will support your child.

- Water tray e.g. rock pool/coloured ice cubes/harbour
- Sand tray e.g. beach combing/treasure/sand castles
- What happens when you add water to dry sand?
- Make ice lollies
- Make fish cakes
- Make the Lighthouse Keeper's packed lunch complete with rope to send it
- Investigate Lighthouses
- Visit the fish counter at the local supermarket
- How far are we from the sea?
- Compare countries with lots of water to those with very little
- Icy water the sea in cold places

Communication and Language

Remember to encourage discussion and conversation. Talking about what you are doing and learning helps to consolidate it into the long term memory. This is the expressive part of language development.

*You will need to do lots of talking about under the sea this week.

*Look at a world map, talk about what the colour blue means on the map, ask your child what they think is and why? What are the different oceans? Are they cold/warm/salty/red.

*Watch the video that is all about under the sea <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=J2BKd5e15Jc&saf</u> <u>e=active</u> talk about what you can see.

*Talk your child about what your favourite under the sea creature is and why, then ask your child what theirs is and why.

*Mrs Chandarana would love to be an octopus so she can do lots of busy jobs at once, which under the sea creature would you want to be and why?

*Go through your fridge/freezer and talk about which foods come from the ocean, this might be fish fingers, prawns, lobster, fish sticks, crab, cod or salmon.

Personal, social and emotional development

- Talk to your child about water safety, in the bath, pools, when playing.
- Talk about any water likes/water fears your child may have
- What would it be like to live on the sea?
- 'I went to live on the sea and I took...'
- Discuss children's seaside trips, go through any photos you may have and talk through them.
- Pictures of countries with no water (landlocked countries)
