Spellings:

Spellings are now being set via spellings shed. Go to

https://www.spellingshed.com/en-gb and log on using your purple mash username and password. If you are struggling to access your account please reply to the latest email from Mr Panting or Mrs Willcox and we will reply with your login details. PLEASE NOTE: If your purple mash password is less than 6 characters e.g. red5 it has been extended to meet the spelling shed site's requirements, it would be red555 for spelling shed, likewise blue3 would blue33 or red43 would be red433. If your purple mash password is already 6 characters or longer it will remain the same for spelling shed.

Strategies to learn your spellings:

Games:


Write a sentence including the spelling words.


Activity 1: PLAN

You can go on any kind of adventure but you need to follow Oliver Jeffers rules of writing a crayon book:

- A new title
- Have to include your new crayon character (can use more if you want!)
- Need a setting (place that the crayons go to)
- Have to introduce your crayon at the beginning
- Needs to be a problem in the story
- Needs to fix the problem at the end

You need to brain storm some ideas about what might happen before you write your story! Here is my plan... remember a plan is short notes and the basic idea of what is going to happen

Remember to add extra details to your plan.. here are your author TOP TIPS:

- Use capital letters and full stops
- Use connectives (and, because, but, so, when, if) to join sentences
- Use adjectives (describing words) to make it exciting
- Neat handwriting (unless you need to write like your crayon in your letters!)


• Edit and check your work makes sense!

Grammar: Sentence types

There are lots of sentences we always use, but they are actually different types of sentences. This week we are going to look at exclamation sentences and command sentences.

Exclamation sentences

These are sentences that are similar to statement sentences. They are sentences that express emotion or excitement. Sometimes it might be a sentence that needs shouting or to add emphasis. They use capital letters at the beginning but end with an exclamation mark!

These are exclamation sentences:

What a beautiful day! Wow, that is a huge whale! I'm really mad at her!

Can you write 4 exclamation sentences that each child might say in this picture... it could be: What a lovely day!



Command sentences

These are sentences that are bossy! They are giving you an instruction and tell you what to do. These are usually short snappy sentences. You find commands in most instructions as they tell you what to do.


These are command sentences:

Go and have a bath.

Fold the paper.

Tidy your table.

You could draw some different settings with weather if you want to or draw your favourite type of weather.
