Spellings:

Spellings are now being set via spellings shed. Go to

<u>https://www.spellingshed.com/en-gb</u> and log on using your purple mash username and password. If you are struggling to access your account please reply to the latest email from Mr Panting or Mrs Willcox and we will reply with your login details. PLEASE NOTE: If your purple mash password is less than 6 characters e.g. red5 it has been extended to meet the spelling shed site's requirements, it would be red555 for spelling shed, likewise blue3 would blue33 or red43 would be red433. If your purple mash password is already 6 characters or longer it will remain the same for spelling shed.

Strategies to learn your spellings:

Games:

Spelling shed has lots of games that will help you learn your spellings. Make sure you try them out!

Rainbow writing:

Write over the word repeatedly in the colours of the rainbow so the children learn the pattern.

Write a sentence including the spelling words. Use a thesaurus to find alternatives.


- Capital letters, full stops, question marks and exclamation marks (where necessary).

- Spelling words that you are familiar with correctly
- Noun phrases using adventurous adjectives

Top tip! Try to use key words or short phrases when writing your plan and save your sentence writing for the next challenge!


Creative writing


-number your instructions
