#### Step 2

Write a list of the different animals you might find in a zoo. You could use the mind map below or draw your own or even make a list!



#### Step 3

Now think of some adjectives to describe your animals, here are some examples:

- Slithery Snake
- Ferocious Rhino
- Silly Monkey

Now you can write a first draft of your poem, here's mine!

In Mr Magoo's Amazing Zoo you will find

A Slithery Snake

A Ferocious Rhino

And a Silly Monkey

## Step 4

Let's make your poem more interesting. You could try some of things listed below:

- List more than six animals.
- Use alliteration, this is the repetition of the same sounds at the beginning of words (slithery snake, roaring rhino)
- Find more than one adjective for each animal (long, slithery snake)
- Have the animals doing an activity (a slithering snake hissing loudly)
- Create different descriptions and activities but for the same type of animal (like the poems you have read; Chameleon Enclosure and Nervous Newts).
- Use numbers (1 slithery snake, 2 ferocious rhinos etc).
- Use simile or metaphor, for example 'a rhino as strong as steel or 'a boulder of a bear"

Here's my improved poem!

In Mr Magoo's Amazing Zoo you will find

One long, slithery snake hissing loudly

Two ferocious rhinos as strong as steel

And a silly, brown monkey eating a banana!

#### Step 5

Perform your poem and enjoy!
