


Week 4 English Activities

English	<p data-bbox="432 342 1114 383"><u>1) LO: To create images from sounds.</u></p> <p data-bbox="432 434 1294 562">Listen to the two pieces of music. What does it make you think of? How does it make you feel? Then add adjectives to describe your nouns. Turn your ideas into noun phrases. Put the information in the table.</p>

	<p><u>3) LO: To understand how to develop poetic lines/phrases from vocabulary.</u></p> <p><u>'Watching wall with a blanket of moss.'</u> Identify the noun, adjective and verb in this poetic phrase.</p> <p>Remind yourself on what these phrases mean - onomatopoeia, rhyme, alliteration and simile. Think of some examples.</p> <p>Activity: Using your ideas turn them into poetic phrases. You don't need to include every poetic feature - choose a few for each phrase.</p> <p><u>4) LO: To build poetic phrases into a poem.</u></p> <p>Activity: Using the images you created in the first lesson and the poetic phrases in the other lessons, create your own short poem either 1, 2 or 3 stanzas long. Use the poems from last week to help you, you can magpie ideas, change and adapt.</p>
