## **Grammar:**

L.O. To understand what is meant by the past progressive tense.

What does 'past progressive tense' mean?

Past Progressive Tense. The PAST PROGRESSIVE TENSE indicates continuing action, something that was happening, going on, at some point in the past. This tense is formed with the helping "to be" verb, in the past tense, plus the present participle of the verb (with an -ing ending): I was riding my bike all day yesterday.

An action that happened in the past and it carried on going for a while, whilst something else happened.

The past continuous tense describes a past action that was happening at the same time as another action occurred.

E.g. They were falling asleep when they heard a loud crash.

The past continuous is used for a continuous action in the past, for example:

I was working hard when the telephone interrupted me.

Everyone was shouting.

They were always arguing.

## Past continuous / progressive



In some sentences, it can also be written as 'have been'. This has been used in exam questions.

E.g. They have been listening to music whilst they cleaned their bedrooms.

Francesca was learning a song for the school play.

Tom found his maths too difficult.

Answer: Francesca was learning a song for the school play.

The past progressive tense can be used to describe an activity in the past which was interrupted:

- He was painting the door when a bird struck the window.
- They were sleeping when the alarm went off.

You can also have a negative version:

- He wasn't painting the door when a bird struck the window.
- They weren't sleeping when the alarm went off.

And the question version:


- Was he painting the door when a bird struck the window?
- Were they sleeping when the alarm went off?

The past progressive tense can also be used for describing an action taking place when another occurred.

- While they were painting the door, I painted the windows.
- While they weren't painting the door, I painted the windows.
- Were they painting the door when I painted the windows?
- Weren't they painting the door when I painted the windows?

And, it can be used for describing an action which was taking place at the same time as another:


■ While they were painting the door, I was painting the windows.
